


Homeless in Iowa in 2015 by House District




Homeless lowans in 2015

- 13,030 People were served.
- 11,777 were homeless for the first time.
- 41% suffered a severe disability.
- 10% were US Military veterans.
- 45% were in families
- 26% of Adults were heading families.

PERMANENT PLACEMENT

- 41% of shelter and transitional clients exit to permanent destinations.

EMERGENCY SHELTER

- 8,473 people in 49 Programs with 1,950 beds.
- Deals with the most immediate and pressing need
- The median emergency shelter stay lasted only 18 days.

TRANSITIONAL HOUSING

- 3,239 people in 60 Programs with 1,656 beds.
- These programs increase stability.
- Only 18% of successful exits saw a return to homelessness within 2 years. Almost half of what we see from emergency shelters.

PERMANENT SUPPORTIVE HOUSING

- 3,273 people in 39 Programs with 1,193 beds.
- Gives people support they need while they take control of their lives
- 73% stayed stably housed or moved on to other stable situations.

We need more funding. Hard working service providers have shown we can succeed.

The situation is bad.

Overall homelessness is up 18% and the number of people experiencing homelessness for the first time has been steadily climbing; up more than 47%



But its not all bad.



Permanent placements have climbed from 35% 5 years ago to 41% today and Recidivism back into homelessness after a permanent placement has remained flat at 26%. Long term homelessness is down It took a lot of hard work.

It can be done.

For example, Des Moines recently **declared victory** in the USICH Mayor's Challenge to end Veteran Homelessness, because Veteran's Affairs **gave case managers the resources** to house homeless veterans.



What are the possibilities with more funding? Iowa ending homelessness!
