Speakers: Dr. Elizabeth Miller is Professor of Pediatrics, Public Health, and Clinical and Translational Science at the University of Pittsburgh School of Medicine, Director of Adolescent and Young Adult Medicine, and director of community and population health at UPMC Children’s Hospital Pittsburgh and holds the Edmund R. McCluskey Endowed Chair in Pediatric Medical Education.

Description: Intimate partner violence (IPV) is a widespread public health problem of epidemic proportions, impacting 1 in 4 U.S. women and 1 in 7 men. IPV contributes to injuries, chronic health issues, and high risk health behaviors. Dr. Miller will share current research and lessons learned on the health impact of IPV and the “CUES” method, an evidence-based and emerging best practice focused on universal education for all patients/clients on how relationships impact health.

Objectives:

By the end of this training participants will be better able to:

- Identify physical and behavioral health challenges associated with Intimate Partner Violence (IPV);
- List the benefits of partnering with a local victim service providers/community agencies to promote bi-directional client referrals;
- Identify self-care and organizational strategies for health settings to promote healing- centered, trauma-informed workplaces;
- Implement a universal education approach to inform patients about healthy relationships and assess for IPV.
